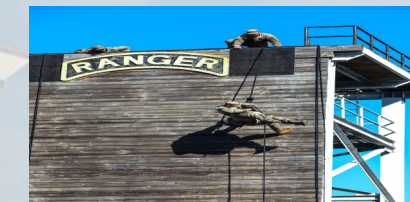

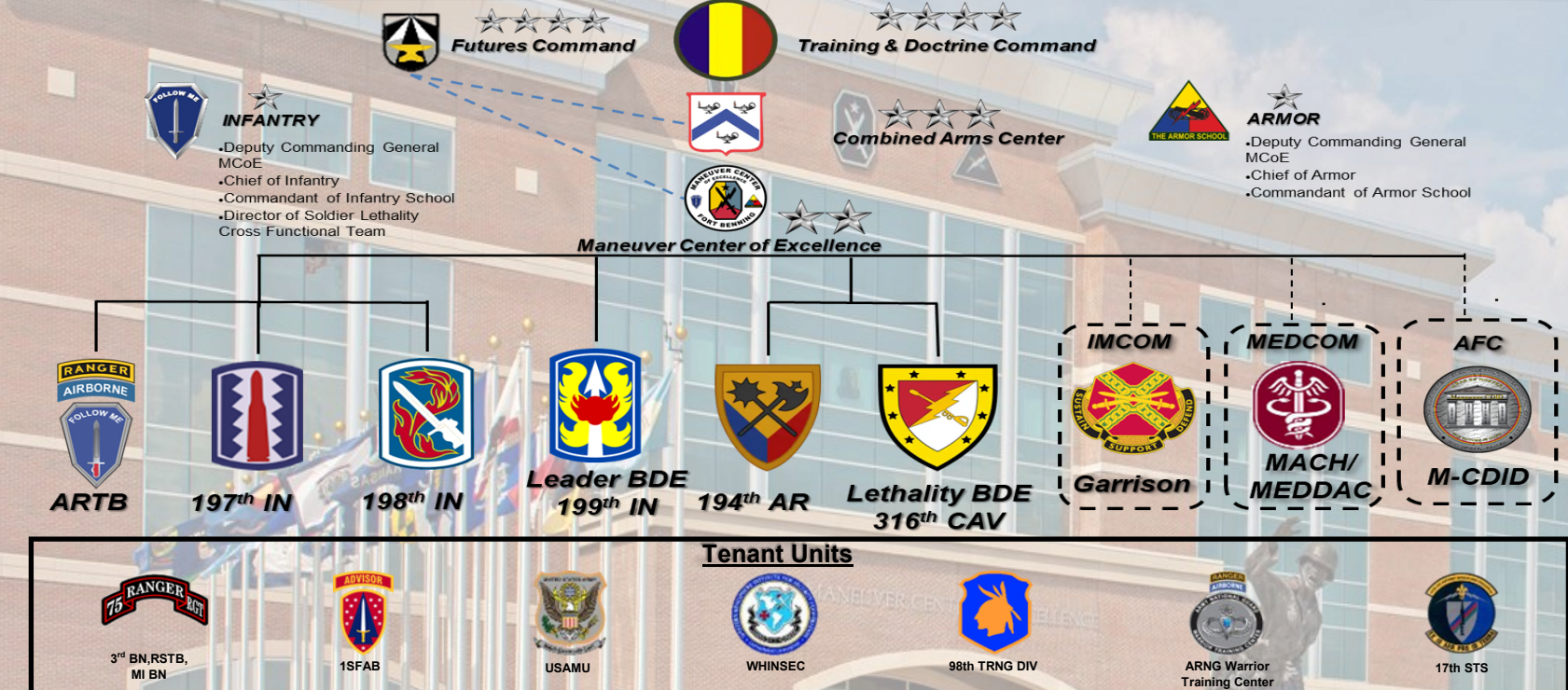

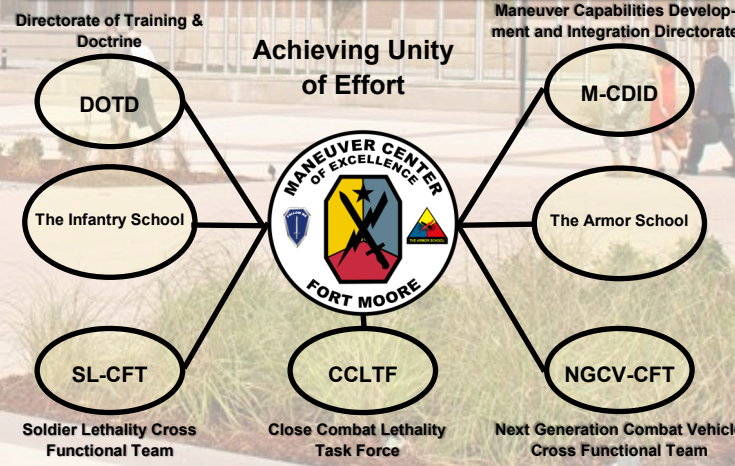

Community

- 133,534 Total Population Served

Housing

- 4001 Total Housing Units; 3502 Occupied Units (87.5% rate)
 - 188 Legacy Units On Hold, 169 of which are unrenovated legacy homes
 - 42 Units set for historic preservation
 - 308 Units currently being or awaiting turnover from former residents
 - Barracks: 118 facilities with a 62% occupancy rate.
- * BAH inaccuracies 2014-2022 have introduced significant risk to portfolio

Child Development Centers

- 5 centers located on Fort Moore
 - 84% occupancy rate - largely due to 74% average staffing rate
- * Continue to actively recruit to fill all vacancies.

DoDEA Schools

- 5 schools located on Fort Moore (4-Elementary and 1-Middle School)
- ~2100 students currently enrolled
